1.0 About the Summit

Background/Context

The Kaduna Education PACT Summit is a convergence of government, stakeholders and development partners to develop a comprehensive Education Development Roadmap which will significantly improve educational outcomes across the state.

Kaduna State intends for the summit to be a collective and strategic collaboration for educational reform, aiming to create a robust and inclusive educational system that serves as a model for other regions. Through innovative solutions, sustained commitment and collaborative efforts, this will lay a strong foundation for intellectual and socio-economic development.

Rationale: *Why this summit is needed now*

Situational analysis of education reveals that despite notable effort and progress on access and improved enrollment at primary and secondary levels particularly that of girls, the persistence of out-of-school children and poor learning outcomes continue to fester.

It is therefore crucial that collective and concerted effort is made by the government to convene civil society, development partners and the private sector to chart innovative and actionable solutions to drive large scale improvements across the sector.

Goals and Objectives of the Summit

The summit aims to forge an **Educational PACT** between the government and the people, establishing commitment to a shared model for education delivery with measurable outcomes and clearly defined non-negotiables. The summit will serve as a platform for stakeholders to deliberate, share best practices, and develop actionable strategies for scaled improvements within Kaduna's education system.

The summit will result in a robust Education Development Plan and model targeting significant and sustainable improvements in access, transition, completion, and inclusion into basic education, as well as tertiary and vocational institutions, with the goal of producing competent graduates who can participate in and compete at global levels.

The objectives of this summit go beyond short-term improvements; they envision a transformative approach to education reform that prioritizes inclusivity, quality, and sustainability.

The summit will serve as a platform for advocacy aimed at enhancing policy and practice in education service delivery, highlighting policy accomplishments and gaps, financing needs, options and priorities, challenges and alternatives, as well as showcasing intervention initiatives supported by evidence, cost-effectiveness, and value for money. Additionally, this objective includes research to determine the per-child cost of education in Kaduna State for inclusion in future budgeting.

In addition to developing the Kaduna State Education Development Model, a Mutual Accountability Framework (MAF) will be designed to monitor and assess progress toward fulfilling each stakeholder's responsibilities, while also identifying and addressing gaps in implementation. This framework will be anchored on key focus areas such as:

- Policy review
- Stakeholder engagement
- Quality assurance
- System strengthening, etc.

3.0 Theme Explanation

The **KADA EDUPACT International Summit 2025** is designed to drive transformative change in Kaduna State's education sector, positioning it as a hub of educational excellence in Nigeria. This landmark summit is anchored on four strategic pillars:

1. Policy, Governance, and Innovative Education Financing
2. Access and Retention
3. Credible Learning Outcomes from Quality Inputs
4. Technology and Innovation

The "PACT" acronym emphasizes the commitment to a strategic partnership and model of implementing educational solutions. These four pillars are not mutually exclusive but rather synergistic components of a comprehensive model to elevate education in the State. The summit's core objective is to forge an **educational PACT with the people**. This PACT represents a commitment to a shared educational model for education delivery, emphasizing measurable outcomes and clearly defined non-negotiables. It signifies a mutual understanding between the government and the community regarding expectations and responsibilities in achieving educational excellence.

The KADA EDUPACT Summit 2025 is designed to articulate the state's priorities and interventions for continuous improvement across the educational landscape. It serves as a platform for stakeholders to collaborate, share best practices, and contribute to the development of actionable strategies. By focusing on policy and governance, access and quality, demonstrable results, and technological innovation, the summit aims to create a sustainable and impactful roadmap for educational transformation in Kaduna State. This initiative reflects a commitment to data-driven decision-making, stakeholder engagement, and a relentless pursuit of excellence in education, ultimately empowering the next generation of Kaduna State citizens.

Main Theme:

Strategic Visioning for Educational Transformation: Developing a Kaduna State Education Model

This theme establishes the foundational philosophical tenets and strategic imperatives for developing a transformative education model uniquely tailored to the socio-cultural, economic, and developmental realities of Kaduna State. It goes beyond mere compliance with federal standards, advocating a context-driven approach that enhances educational relevance, effectiveness, and long-term impact within the state.



As the intellectual and strategic anchor of the KADA 2025 International Summit, the theme will drive critical discussions and collaborative planning processes aimed at translating this vision into concrete strategies and actionable plans for the comprehensive transformation of Kaduna State's education system.

The theme and sub-themes will draw depth and direction from five key focus areas. The keynote address will explore the main theme, while the lead papers, panel discussions, and breakout sessions will delve into the sub-themes and their respective components.

SUB-THEMES

Sub Theme I: Reimagining Education

- **Redefining Learning Outcomes:** Aligning learning outcomes with non-negotiables of learning.
- **Implementing a Competency-Based curriculum:** Focusing on students' demonstration of skills and knowledge.
- **TVET Opportunities:** Enhancing status and expanding access
- **AI and Technology-Enhanced Learning:** Integrating and leveraging digital tools to enhance teaching and learning.

Sub theme II: Teacher Empowerment

- **Teacher Agency:** Focusing on teacher independence and motivation
- **Teacher Recruitment and Management:** Institutionalizing system for transparent, competitive and competency-based recruitment and management of teachers.
- **Teacher Professional Development:** Providing ongoing training and support for educators.
- **Teachers' Support and Collaboration:** Coaching and mentoring for teacher improvement, and fostering peer-to-peer learning and sharing best practices.
- **AI and Technology-capacitated Teachers:** Leveraging digital technology and AI to enhance CPD.

Sub theme III: Expansion of Access: OOSC, Inclusive and Equitable Education

- **Accessibility:** Ensuring education is accessible to all, regardless of ability or disability.
 - Almajiri Education
 - Improving Girl Child Education

- **Addressing Disparities:** Closing gaps in educational outcomes and opportunities.
 - Reaching the last mile: Rural and Urban

Education Policy and Performance: Making education policies work for transformative educational visions, goals and results.

Innovative education financing and cost per child of education: Developing best practice education financing solutions and models.

Educational Leadership Development: Building capacity for effective educational leadership.

Public Private Partnership and Community Engagement: Fostering partnerships between private sector (including industries), schools and communities.

Expanding Infrastructural Development: Sustainable and equitable expansion of schools' infrastructural development.

Subtheme V: Monitoring, Evaluation and Quality Assurance

Assessment and Evaluation: Developing and implementing innovative assessment methods for learners, teachers and schools.

Data-Driven Decision Making: Using technology and data to inform educational decisions.

Continuous Improvement: Encouraging a culture of ongoing improvement, scalability and sustainability

Links to global, national, and state education priorities (e.g., SDG 4, Nigeria's ESP, Kaduna Education Reform Agenda)

4.0 Expected Outcomes

A Kaduna State Education Strategic Roadmap will be developed, charting a clear pathway towards ensuring formidable improvements and reforms in Kaduna State. This roadmap will detail actionable education strategies as a package for implementing and maintaining sustainable transformation. This would crystallize into the Kaduna State specific model for improving learning outcomes, teacher training, infrastructural development, curriculum updates, and resource allocation.

- i. **Expanded Access & Equity** – prioritising the girl-child, learners with disabilities, nomadic and conflict-affected communities.
- ii. **Quality Teaching & Learning** – investing in teacher capacity, hybrid CBT/Paper-based assessments, and competency-based curricula.
- iii. **Sustainable Financing** – blending State resources, concessional financing, innovative PPPs, and results-based grants.
- iv. **Digital Transformation** – scaling our Education Management Information system, AI-assisted learning analytics, and broadband connectivity for every school.
- v. **Gender Equity & Inclusion** – mainstreaming life-skills and menstrual-health programmes that keep adolescent girls in school.
- vi. **System Resilience & Governance** – embedding continuous monitoring, evaluation, and adaptive learning across every initiative.

5.0 Summit Structure

PROGRAMME BRIEF

About PLANE- Partnership for Learning for All in Nigeria (PLANE) is a nine-year education programme, funded by the UK Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO). It aims to support and realise the Government of Nigeria's commitment to deliver sustainable improvements in learning outcomes for all of Nigeria's children.

PLANE's mission is to bring about sustainable improvements in learning outcomes. PLANE seeks to achieve this mission through improvements in teaching and learning with a focus on foundational skills; unlocking governance bottlenecks for better education service delivery; improvements in the regulation of the non-state sector; embedding the use of data and evidence within the education system; supporting the education of children affected by conflict; working with community structures and improving the inclusion and learning of marginalised children as a whole.

What we do: The programme's scope extends across three strategic windows of intervention, namely foundational skills development (led by DAI, FHI360 and other partners), education in emergency situations (led by UNICEF), and community-centred initiatives (led by Save the Children). It is supported by the DELVe evidence, learning and accountability function.

All of Nigeria's children deserve access to a high-quality education system that gives them the skills they need to build a brighter and more prosperous future.

Where we work- PLANE works at the federal level, in the southwest region and in five states (Kaduna, Kano, Jigawa, Yobe and Borno) with legislators, state and non-state education providers, civil society organisations, teachers' union, community leaders, learners and parents.

The PLANE programme has the potential to reach up to eight million children. It aims to enhance teaching and learning for approximately 1.5 million children. Additionally, PLANE's initiatives in education during emergencies are expected to benefit around 600,000 children. By targeting various aspects of the education landscape, PLANE seeks to lay the foundation for improved learning outcomes, increased accessibility and enhanced educational quality for generations to come.

ABOUT THE ROOSC PROJECT



The Reaching Out-of-School Children Project (ROOSC) is a 4-year project aimed at supporting Kaduna State in increasing access to learning opportunities, improving enrollment, and ensuring active participation and completion of quality primary education by all children, particularly those with disabilities, girls, and adolescents. It aims to complement the efforts of the government and those of its development partners to effectively and substantially reduce the number of OOSC.

- ▶ Out-of-School Children - **200,000 OOSC enrolled in Basic education**
- ▶ In-School Children - **1.2million children to benefit from TLM, improved environment, quality teaching**
- ▶ Capacity Buiding - **70% of teachers complete CPD programs, and schools to receive at least 3 QA Supervisory visits per year**



The Adolescent Girls Initiative for Learning and Empowerment (AGILE) Project aims to lay the foundation for a long-term engagement on adolescent girls' education and empowerment.

The project is a credit from the World Bank's International Development Association (IDA) to the Federal Government of Nigeria, for the implementation of the AGILE Project, in selected eleven (21) states of the Federation viz; Borno, Ekiti, Kaduna, Kano, Katsina, Kebbi Plateau, Adamawa, Bauchi, Gombe, Jigawa, Kogi, Kwara, Nasarawa, Niger, Sokoto, Yobe, Zamfara, Taraba, Enugu and Delta.



The project has successfully renovated 861 classrooms and 2,672 WASH facilities, including toilets, solar power boreholes, and manual boreholes; provided 46,922 sets of furniture; and fenced 10 schools.

Community engagement efforts have reached over 18,000 community members, including emirs, chiefs, district heads, village heads, and religious leaders, galvanising their support for girls education and empowerment.

The State performed exceptionally in the Edition Maiden AGILE Games, winning across 5 categories and runners-up across 3 other categories. 23,000 girls, including those with special needs, and 1,864 boys are currently being trained in life skills, with the training of over 36,000 students being trained in digital literacy skills.

Other beneficiaries include 40,000+ under the girls scholarship program across different schools.

The project development objective is to improve secondary education opportunities among girls in targeted areas in participating states.
